HISTORY OF THE GREAT WARHAWK NATION

The distinguished history of the 480th began during World War II when it was constituted as a training squadron at MacDill Field, FL. The 480th Fighter Squadron, the Warhawks, was activated later in 1957 at England Air Force Base, Louisiana as the 480th Fighter Bomber Squadron, flying the F-100 Super Sabre. After a tumultuous deactivation and reactivation period in the late 1950's, the 480th was reactivated as the 480th Tactical Fighter Squadron on 8 May 1962, under United States Air Forces in Europe, and based at Chaumont and later Phalsbourg-Bourscheid Air Base, France flying first the F-84F Thunderstreak and later the F-100 Super Sabre.

The 480 TFS and its F-100's were reassigned to Holloman AFB, NM in 1963 and in 1965 the squadron began to receive F-4C Phantom II fighters. It was deployed to Da Nang Air Base, South Vietnam, in February 1966 as part of the USAF buildup in Southeast Asia and was engaged in combat operations, mostly in North Vietnam, from 1966-1971. During this period, the squadron scored nine MiG kills, including the first MiG-21 kill of the Vietnam War, and received two Presidential Unit Citations. Also during this period a member of the 480 TFS, Captain Lance Sijan, became the first Air Force Academy graduate to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroism as a prisoner in North Vietnam. In 1969 the Warhawks moved to Phu Cat Air Base, South Vietnam, then to Cam Ranh Bay Air Base, South Vietnam in 1970. With the drawdown of American forces in South Vietnam, the Warhawks flew their last combat mission and the last combat sortie from Cam Ranh Bay on 20 Oct 1971, after which the squadron was deactivated.

The Warhawks were reactivated in 1976 as part of the 52nd Tactical Fighter Wing, Spangdahlem Air Base, flying the F-4D Phantom II, the F-4E and then F-4G as part of the "Wild Weasel" Suppression of Enemy Air Defenses (SEAD) mission. In March 1987, the Warhawks began flying the Air Force's newest fighter, the F-16C Fighting Falcon (known as the Viper) and during the Gulf War received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Citation for Valor. With Cold War military reductions, the Warhawks were forced into temporary retirement in 1994, but the Great Warhawk Nation was reactivated in 2010 as the 480th Fighter Squadron, flying the F-16CM Block-50 as part of the 52nd Fighter Wing at Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany. The Warhawks have since continued to distinguish themselves in combat operations Operation Odyssey Dawn over Libya, and Operation New Dawn in Iraq. Today the squadron is the only US Air Force SEAD squadron based in Europe, and the Warhawks proudly carry on the Wild Weasel legacy and the tradition of being "First In ... Last Out!"

COLONEL DAVID B. LYONS



Colonel David B. Lyons is the commander of the 52nd Operations Group, 52nd Fighter Wing, Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany. The unit consists of two fighter squadrons, an air control squadron, and an operations support squadron. The group's 550 people, 24 F-16, 18 A-10 fighter aircraft, and 2 TPS-75 mobile radar units stand ready to support NATO and combatant command authorities with combat airpower in the mission areas of suppression of enemy air defenses, close air support, air interdiction, counter air, air strike control, combat search and rescue, and theater airspace control.

Colonel Lyons entered the Air Force in 1992, receiving his commission through ROTC. He graduated from the

Georgia Institute of Technology with a bachelor's degree in Industrial Management. Colonel Lyons attended undergraduate pilot training at Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, and remained there for lead-in fighter training. He has held various operational F-16 and A/OA-10 flying positions, served as a jump battalion air liaison officer with the Army's 82nd Airborne Division, airpower strategist for CHECKMATE and commanded the 34th Fighter Squadron at Hill Air Force Base, Utah. Colonel Lyons is a graduate of both the School of Advanced Air and Space Studies and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. He has multiple combat deployments to Operations Southern Watch, Iraqi Freedom, and Enduring Freedom.

He is a senior pilot with more than 2,000 flying hours in the T-37, T-38, F-16C/D and A/OA-10, to include 397 combat flight hours.

LIEUTENANT COLONEL PAUL J. MURRAY



Lieutenant Colonel Paul "Dino" Murray is the Commander, 480th Fighter Squadron at Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany—the "Warhawks." The squadron flies the F-16CM Block 50 Viper in support of NATO and the National Command Authorities. The 480th is the only USAF suppression of enemy air defense squadron in Europe and also supports the Supreme Allied Commander Europe with expeditionary air power for counterair, close air support, air interdiction, and strategic attack.

Lt Col Murray graduated from the United States Air Force Academy in 1994 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering. He has extensive experience in fighter operations including weapons, training, scheduling, and standardization and evaluation. Two months after 9/11, Lt Col Murray deployed to Kandahar Air Base, Afghanistan with 3rd Brigade, 101st Airborne Division where he commanded all conventional Joint Terminal Attack Controllers on the ground during Operation ANACONDA. Later, he commanded the Tactical Air Control Party assigned to the division's Assault Command Post during major combat operations in IRAQI FREEDOM and coordinated airpower for the Screaming Eagles' march from Kuwait to Mosul. While flying F-16s in Italy, Lt Col Murray again deployed to the Middle East and flew combat sorties over Iraq and Afghanistan. Prior to his current assignment he served in the Pentagon on the Joint Staff as an Operations Officer in the Joint Operations Division (J-3). On 19 March 2011, Lt Col Murray led The Great Warhawk Nation into combat over Libya on the first night of Operation ODESSEY DAWN.

Lt Col Murray is a command pilot with more than 2,300 flight hours in the F-16 including 580 combat hours in Operations SOUTHERN WATCH, JOINT FORGE, JOINT GUARDIAN, IRAQI FREEDOM, ENDURING FREEDOM, ODESSEY DAWN, UNIFIED PROTECTOR, and NEW DAWN. He is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Kimberley Ann Meltz of Calumet City, IL. They have 4 children: Kendall, Jakob, Grace and Keira.

THE CHANGE OF COMMAND

The Change of Command Ceremony is rooted in military history dating back to the 16th century during the reign of King Frederick the Great of Prussia. During this time, organizational flags were developed with color arrangements and symbols unique to each particular unit. To this flag and its commander, the soldiers of the unit would dedicate their loyalty and trust. When a Change of Command was to take place, the outgoing commander would pass the flag to the individual assuming command. This gesture was accomplished in the front of the unit so that all could see and witness their new leader assuming his dutiful position. He who controlled the flag also controlled the soldiers and their allegiances. This symbolic tradition has survived throughout military history and today will serve as the key event of this solemn military ceremony.
